The student will be expected to demonstrate proficiency in French (present, past, future, conditional and subjunctive) at the basic level in:

- 1. Aural comprehension of simple discourse in various tenses.
- 2. Reading comprehension of simplified texts.
- 3. Speech delivery: express feelings and reactions and narrate in the past.
- 4. Written expression: guided composition
- 5. Understanding target cultures.

N: Course Content

- 1. More complex syntactic structures.
- 2. Basic lexicon.
- 3. The phonological system of French.
- 4. The culture of the Francophone world.

O: Methods of Instruction

The functional and communicative approach will be used.

Classroom activities include: presentation of material by the instructor, practice in pairs, listening comprehension, audio-visual presentations, and conversation practice in small groups with a Native Language Assistant.
