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0 :	Methods of Instruction

The course will be taught by a combination of informal lecture and structured discussion. Class participation will be encouraged throughout all aspects of the course. As dialogue is essential to philosophical growth, time will be allowed for in-depth, "give and take" discussions between individual students and the instructor and between individual students and other students, as well as for more general class discussions. Students may be invited to participate in classinstruction, if they so desire, by giving seminars. Some audio-visual materials, focussing on particular ethical problems, or the understanding of such problems, will be used.
