### Variety and Tune

Musicality in speech (finding the proper pitch)

Practical application of all the means of emphasis available to the actor: phrasing, pausing, change of tone, pitch, power, rhythm, pace; use of inflection, tone colour, intensity,

Difficulties in reading and projecting blank verse.

### Q. METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

1. Relaxation exercises in class to develop tonal quality and to free the voice.

2. Student performance activities to test their skills.

Vocal exercises in class to develop good speech habits.

4. Constant stress on practical application of theory learned.

Practical material from poems, plays, prose pieces, excerpts from Shakespeare for classroom use and student practice use at home.
